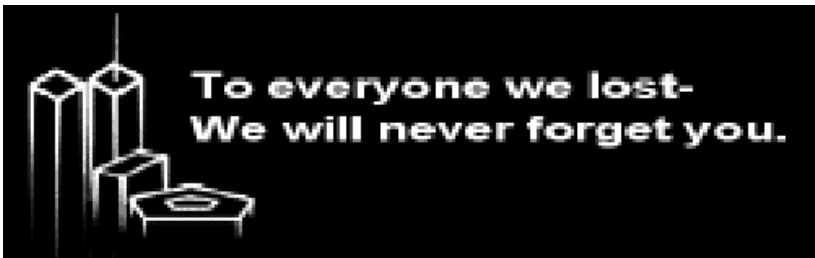
and out of the ashes, yes, heroes rose!
