# **Legislative Visits**

Each year, the Association of Community College Trustees holds its Community College National Legislative Summit in Washington, D.C. The 2013 Summit is scheduled from Sunday, February 11, to Wednesday, February 14. I have traditionally traveled to Washington during the Summit to meet with legislators, who make themselves available during this conference. This year, Assemblyman Dave Wolfe, Special Assistant to the President, and I will visit Washington on Tuesday and Wednesday. Mr. Wolfe has scheduled meetings for us to visit with Congressmen Chris Smith and Jon Runyan to discuss issues important to community colleges in general and to Ocean County College specifically.

The New Jersey Council of County Colleges also coordinates a number of activities during the Summit, such as receptions and meetings with legislators and national media members. Mr. Wolfe and I will be attending the NJCCC special reception on Tuesday, February 13.

# **Academic Affairs Initiatives**


- ♦ Program development and improvement At the Spring 2013 Colloquium on Friday, January 18, six workshops/focus groups/open forums were presented by faculty members:
  - **♦** Achieving Success through Service
  - ♦ OCC Honors Program: A Listening Forum for Feedback and Improvement
  - **♦** Faculty Development
  - **♦** A Brush-Up Course for Accuplacer Test Takers
  - ♦ Global Education at OCC: Paradigm Shift to a Global Community Implementation through Infusion
  - ♦ Internships: OCC's Best Kept Secret

The attached **Colloquium flyer** provides additional **information** on each of the **sessions**.

Following the presentations, all **faculty** gathered together and each group **shared** the **results** of their **discussions**, **outlined** their **plans** for **moving forward**, and **solicited feedback**. The **ideas** identified at Colloquium will be **fully developed** during the **spring semester**.

### Other program endeavors include:

- ♦ The development of a new concentration in the A.A.S. Business Degree that will combine business with technology. It will be called Business and Web-Based Technology.
- ♦ Working with the Monmouth-Ocean Development Council, internship opportunities will be sought for new and existing programs.
- ♦ A timeframe has been identified for the development of the BSN program with Kean University, which is attached.
- ♦ As a result of a meeting with a team from Monmouth University, the A.A.S. degree in Homeland Security is being strengthened and a joint information session will be held in spring.





- ♦ Academic Leadership Team (ALT) In order to achieve greater transparency, the ALT weekly agenda will be publicized in advance of each meeting, inviting those who are interested to attend the meetings to provide input in the process. An invitation is also being extended to the Student Government Association to participate.
- ♦ Instructional Technology Academic Affairs has begun the preparation to work with the Information Technology Department in developing a long-term plan for instructional technology. The goal is to take full advantage of the technology already acquired by the College as well as to consider the future technology needs that will better serve the existing and new academic programs. A timetable will be developed to outfit the basic technology in all instructional facilities.
- ♦ Academic Scheduling The current scheduling practices are being examined by ALT. After initial discussions with students and representatives from other departments of the College, a special committee is being formed consisting of students, advisors, faculty, and student intake representatives to develop recommendations for change with the goal of producing class schedules that better serve our students while, at the same time, maximizing classroom space.

#### **Black History Month**

February is designated nationally as Black History Month. The Association for the Study of African-American Life and History, the founder of Black History Month, has dedicated the 2013 theme as "At the Crossroads of Freedom and Equality: The Emancipation Proclamation and the March on Washington" to celebrate the anniversary of two important African-American turning points – the 1863 Emancipation Proclamation and the 1963 March on Washington.

In recognition of Black History Month at Ocean County College, the following events are sponsored by the Organization for Black Unity (OBU) and the Office of Student Life:

- ♦ Friday, February 1, at 12:00 noon, the Opening Ceremony and Raising of the Black Flag will be held at the Flag Pole. From 12:30 to 2:00 p.m., a Soul Food Tasting, African Drumming, and Open Mic Read-In will take place in the College Center Solar Lounge.
- ♦ Friday, February 8, at 2:00 p.m., an Open Forum Discussion, "What is Black?" will be held in the Solar Lounge. This presentation will explore the possible answers and how they affect viewpoints and opinions.
- ♦ Monday, February 11, at 1:00 p.m., a Film and Workshop will be held in the Black Box Theatre of the Arts and Community Center. A look at the stereotypes of African-American men, using



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the award-winning short film *The Negro Zone*, will be followed by an open forum entitled, "The Hot Seat."

- ♦ Saturday, February 23, at 7:00 p.m., the 13th Annual Gospel Show, an evening of song, dance, and gospel music, will be held in the Arts and Community Center Theatre. Admission is \$7 for adults and \$5 for students, seniors, and children. A portion of the proceeds will be donated to OCC's Disaster Relief Fund. Tickets can be purchased at the Student Life Office.
- ♦ Thursday, February 28, at 12:00 noon, the Closing Ceremony and Lowering of the Black Flag will be held at the Flag Pole. From 12:30 to 2:00 p.m., a Soul Food Tasting, African Drumming, and Open Mic Read-In will take place in the Solar Lounge.

Coordinating these events are Dr. Henry Jackson, Interim Dean of Language, Humanities, and Fine Arts and OBU Advisor, and Ms. Sarai Simpson, Student President of OBU.

# **Ocean County College Chess Team**

The Ocean County College Chess Team competed for the first time in an international event, the Pan-American Intercollegiate Chess Championships, at Princeton University from December 27-30. This event attracts four-year institutions from North and South America. OCC was one of a very few number of community colleges to participate.

Competing against institutions like Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Cornell, and the University of Chicago, the OCC team did well but was unable to win any matches. However, this experience has solidified the OCC Chess Team as a competitive unit. The team is currently making plans to compete in the United States Amateur Team East Chess Tournament scheduled from February 16-18 in Parsippany.
