Enrollment

The ten-week Fall Quick Term began on Wednesday, October 10th. This year, 900 students registered for a total of **3,946 credits**, representing an increase in total enrollment of **29.5 percent**, with an increase in total credit hours of 26.8 percent over last year. Full-time enrollment is up 37.8 percent to 51 students, and part-time student enrollment is up 29.0 percent at 849 students.

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The combined total unduplicated headcount for the Fall Semester and the Fall Quick Term is 10,282, an increase of 2.3 percent from 10,046 last year. The total number of credits is 104,788, up 8.2 percent from last year's total of 96,840. This is the second time in the history of the college that student enrollment exceeded 10,000 in the Fall Semester and the Fall Ouick Term combined.

Ocean County College Audit

The Ocean County College 2008 Report of Audit for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2008, will be presented to the trustees for acceptance on Monday. I am pleased to inform you that the auditor concludes that the financial statements present fairly the financial position of the business-type activities of the college and that no deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting were identified.

Representatives from the auditing firm, **Bowman and Company**, will **present** their **findings** to the members of the Finance Committee and the full Board on Monday.

Ocean County College Women's Soccer Team

Last year, the **Women's Soccer Team** finished **fourth** in the **nation**. This year, the team is **headed** to the Final Four of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Tournament.



With a 5-0 victory over Gloucester County College on October 7th, the Women's Soccer Team went undefeated in Region XIX divisional play and the Garden State Athletic Conference division. This win earned the OCC team the Garden State Athletic Conference Title and the top seed in the Region XIX tournament. It also earned Head Coach Karen Trump the GSAC "Coach of the Year" award. This was her 50th win in six seasons leading Women's Soccer.

The team then won the Region XIX Division III Tournament with a 4-1 victory over Camden County College. The team had an overall record of 16-2 and was undefeated in NJCAA Division III play (11-0).

On October 26th, the team (17-2) then went on to defeat Oxford College of Emory University (15-5) by the score of 2-0 to win District C and advance to the Final Four of the NJCAA National Tournament. District C encompasses schools from New Jersey, Eastern Pennsylvania, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, District of Columbia, Maryland, Western Pennsylvania, and Georgia.

The Vikings will now play on November 8th and 9th in the Final Four for the NJCAA Division III National Championship in Richland, Texas. Needless to say, we are thrilled with the stellar performance of the team, Coaches Karen and AJ Trump, and Director of Athletics, Ilene Cohen. Judy and I will be traveling to Dallas to cheer on the team at the National Tournament.

Ocean County College Athletic Program

- ♦ <u>Men's Soccer</u> The team did extremely well, finishing second in the Garden State Athletic Conference. However, the men lost in the semi-final round of the Region XIX tournament to the County College of Morris. Mr. Jason Asch is the team coach.
- ♦ <u>Women's Tennis</u> Under the leadership of Coach Stan Friedman, the team enjoyed another fine season, qualifying for the National tournament this spring in Arizona. They finished second in the Garden State Athletic Conference and third in Region XIX.

Additionally, I am delighted to say that I was honored with the Pacesetter Award, an award that is presented to a community college chief executive in each of NCMPR's seven districts who has demonstrated an outstanding commitment to marketing and communications at his or her college and who has demonstrated strong personal leadership in the institution's community outreach endeavors.

All of this recognition is the result of the good work of Ms. Tara Kelly, Vice President of College Advancement; Ms. Jan Kirsten, Director of College Relations; and their outstanding and creative staff. Warm congratulations are extended to all of them.

NJ STARS Program

As you know, **Dr. Larry Nespoli, President of NJCCC**, and **I** represented the community colleges on the **NJ STARS Task Force** appointed by **Governor Corzine** to **review** and **make recommendations** to the **NJ STARS Program**. **Mr. Dave Wolfe**, **Assemblyman** and **Special Assistant to the President**, **cosponsored** this **legislation** with **Assemblypersons Patrick Diegnan** and **Pamela Lampitt** and also **served** as a **member** of the **Task Force**.

On October 23rd, the New Jersey Assembly Higher Education Committee amended NJ STARS legislation as proposed by the Task Force. I expect that both the Assembly and the Senate will approve this revised bill.



I will share with you the changes that were made to the program in an effort to strengthen the academic requirements and to keep the program affordable. Basically, eligibility for the NJ STARS I Program will be revised from the top 20 percent of high school graduates to the top 15 percent. Additionally, NJ STARS I students must achieve at least a 3.25 grade point average at the community college to continue in the NJ STARS II Program at the four-year institutions.

Foundations of Excellence

This summer, Ocean County College was selected as one of 50 colleges and universities nationwide to participate in *Foundations of Excellence in the First College Year*, a comprehensive, guided self-study and improvement process that enhances an institution's ability to realize its goals for student learning, success, and persistence

Foundations of Excellence is sponsored by John Gardner's Policy Center on the First Year of College. The centerpiece of *Foundations of Excellence* is a model for excellence as outlined through a set of nine principles referred to as Foundational Dimensions. Developed collaboratively with over 300 institutions, these Dimensions provide an inspirational model to help guide the institution in the evaluation of the quality of education provided to its students.

The purpose of this project will be to produce an evidence-based action plan for change that will improve the quality of education for students during the first college year. *Foundations of Excellence* will demonstrate our national leadership as we focus on this crucial time in our students' development and engagement in the habits of learning. We anticipate that the self-study will be completed and a report will be prepared by May 13, 2009.

I have asked Mr. Don Doran, Vice President of Student Affairs, and Ms. Maureen Reustle, Dean of Academic Services, to serve as co-chairs of this project. They will provide a report at Monday's meeting on the progress made to date for the implementation of this self-study.

GED Testing at Ocean County College

In May 2006, Ocean County College began its GED (General Educational Development) testing on campus, offering New Jersey residents the opportunity to achieve a New Jersey state-endorsed high school diploma. Ocean County College is one of thirteen of the nineteen community colleges in the state that conducts GED testing.

Ms. Carol Cappetta is OCC's GED Chief Examiner. She recently learned from the New Jersey Department of Education that in 2007, OCC's first full year of testing, 505 students completed the



seven hour test. Of that number, **391 passed** the test and **3 did not complete** it. OCC's passing rate of **78 percent** was among the highest in the state.

As a GED testing site, OCC plays a very important role in the lives of Ocean County residents who wish to achieve a high school diploma. The number of people taking and passing the GED test at Ocean County College continues to increase. With additional test dates being offered at the Southern Education Center in 2009, it is expected that even more residents will take advantage of this service in the upcoming year.

Annual Harvest Party

The Ocean County College Alumni Association's 12th Annual Scott Chinery Harvest Party was held on Saturday, October 18th, in the College Center and adjacent onion field. The event provides a day of fun activities and refreshments for children who have suffered the devastating effects of cancer and for their families. This event continues to be led by Ms. Monica Vermeulen, 1999 OCC graduate, and the Harvest Party Committee, which is comprised of many alumni who have supported the event from its inception in 1997. In addition, current Phi Theta Kappa students manage and staff the Craft and Game Tent with student organizations from OCC and Phi Theta Kappa chapters from Hudson and Brookdale community colleges.

This year's party was supported with monetary or in-kind donations from over sixty organizations, businesses, and/or individuals. This year, former NY Giants player, Keith Elias, joined the festivities as a celebrity guest signing autographs and posing for photos with the children. Other new features included a live rock and roll band and the Markland Renaissance group, which staged an exciting choreographed medieval sword and shield mini-tournament that the older children particularly enjoyed.

Over 100 children attended the party this year, along with their parents and siblings. It is a wonderful, heart-warming, and rewarding experience for all who plan, participate in, and enjoy the day. Ms. Sandy Broughton, Executive Director of Resource Development, will be with us on Monday to comment on the Harvest Party.

Ocean County College Sailing Program

The OCC Sailing Team and the Toms River Yacht Club co-hosted the Middle Atlantic Intercollegiate Sailing Association (MAISA) Qualifying Regatta on the Toms River on September 20th and 21st. College sailing teams that participated included Ocean County College, Christopher Newport University, Columbia University, Cornell University, Drexel University, Fordham University, Loyola College, Monmouth University, Princeton University, Queen's University, St. Mary's College, Stevens Institute, U.S. Naval Academy, University of Delaware, University of



Maryland at Baltimore County, University of Pennsylvania, Villanova University, and Washington College.

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OCC's Sailing Team finished in first place in a two-day regatta, Coho Memorial, hosted by Webb Institute in Glen Cove, New York, over the weekend of September 27th and 28th. Finishing in first place in the A division were Joe Lepis and Luci Saraceno. Holden Muehleisen and Samantha Gonzalez won the B division.

OCC also finished first in the McCurday Open Regatta hosted by the University of Delaware on the Bohemia River in Maryland on October 11th and 12th. Sailing in the A division was Bradford Wright and sailing in the **B** division was Holden Muehleisen. Crewing in their first regatta were Marion Burke, Lisa Ricciardi, and Sarah Salter.

During the weekend of October 18th and 19th at the Washington College Regatta, the OCC Sailing Team qualified for the MAISA Championship War Memorial Regatta. OCC is the only junior college ever to compete in the War Memorial Regatta and will sail among MAISA's top 18 schools at **Cornell University** on November 1st and 2nd.

We are proud of the wonderful success of the OCC Sailing Team and commend Mr. Roy Wilkins, Manager of Recreation Activities, and all of the members of the Sailing Team. We wish them well at the War Memorial Regatta.

Sustainable Roofing

The U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) rating system was developed in response to market demand for "green" buildings to reduce or eliminate **negative impacts** on the **environment**. As the college continues its efforts to be **environmentally** friendly, we continually seek new ways to improve our stewardship.

One of those ways is green roofing. As is usually the case, **Europe leads** the way when it comes to energy savings. As far back as 1997, Germany spent over \$400 million on the installation of green roofing. Because of the success realized, there will now be a considerable interest in the use of green roofing in this country as the cost of fuel and energy increases.

Mr. Ken Olsen, Executive Director of Facilities and Engineering Operations, will discuss the construction of green roofs at Monday's meeting as well as share with you some of the environmental benefits of this technology, such as a reduction in HVAC equipment and insulation requirements, decreased noise levels, marketing exposure, and storm water management.

The Ocean County College annual Veterans Day ceremony will be held on Friday, November 11th, at 11 a.m. at the Veterans Memorial on the campus mall. A reception will immediately follow in the Library Tower Room, at which Ms. Martha Cybyk, Adjunct Professor, will play the piano. Beachy, United States Navy, Commanding **Officer** at the **Naval Air Engineering Station in Lakehurst.** Also participating in the program will be the Color Guard, United States Marine Corps League, Attachment 796, Toms River; the OCC **Concert Band Trombone Ensemble**; and the Rifle Squad, American Legion, Post 129, Toms River. "Taps" will be played by Mr. Frank Richetti, United States Marine Corps League.

• Dr. Marilyn Kralik, Professor of Fine Arts and Media Studies, presented a paper on "Religion" and Identity in Islamic Art" at the International Conference on Art, Religion, and Identity that
