That is in the way of ratings. I would tell you right where I am but I can't. This is my new address. /Pvt. George Fagan 33087099, 22nd Material Squadron, A.P.O. Postmaster San Francisco, Cal./ I will write you soon and tell you more Your Loving Son George"

During the war, Fagan acted as a Staff Sergeant of the 7th Air Force Machinist Division, where he helped work on planes such as the Pursuit, B-24s and B-17s.

One of Trimble's students, Jacob Morgan, said that the most rewarding part of participating in the project is "being able to transcribe a piece of history for the ancestors of this war hero [Fagan] so his grandchildren can know that he was a part of something that shaped today's world."

"I think the most rewarding part [of participating in this project] has been being able to learn about the man behind the letters and what being in the war must have been like," Reyna Diaz, one of Trimble's students, said. "It has been truly amazing to sort of travel back in time through these letters."

"I work on a letter a day, and I look forward to it," Trimble said. "I feel like I've gotten to know George Fagan."
