~~While the focus of the class is on the orations of Cicero against Cataline, translation of other authors are given equal weight. These relate to the politics, geography and culture of the Roman world and to later European cultures influenced by Latin. The 1<sup>st</sup> and the 4<sup>th</sup> orations against Cataline are also covered. This course is designed for beginning students or students who have taken one year or less of high school Latin.~~

*In this course students are introduced to Latin vocabulary and grammar, with a view to gaining sufficient fluency to read classical texts. Stress is likewise placed on the Latin roots of English words and the influence of Latin on the vocabulary and structure of the Romance languages. Students will read Latin texts focusing on the history, culture and mythology of the ancient Greeks and Romans.*

The course emphasizes the development of aural skills with diatonic harmony: melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic dictation, tertian chord recognition, and intensive sight-singing activities using solmization.
