Ocean County College Athletics

Ocean County College's athletic teams and their coaches deserve our congratulations for an outstanding winter season:

Men's Basketball – The team finished the season as Region XIX Champions and played at the National Championship at Sullivan County Community College in New York from March 10-12. In the first championship game, OCC defeated Massachusetts Bay County College with a score of 61-59 in a very exciting game. The team moved to the national semi-finals but was defeated 77-71 by Mountain View County College, Texas, the eventual national champions. The OCC Vikings finished as the fifth place team nationally.

JaMario Clayton was named Region XIX Player of the Year, Steve Salley was recognized as the Region XIX Tournament MVP, and Darnell Braggs was named to the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) All-National Tournament Team.

Women's Basketball – The team finished fourth in the Garden State Athletic Conference and fifth in Region XIX. Elizabeth Lawler was named NJCAA Player of the Week for the week of February 16. She was among the top ten in scoring average and was second in the nation in rebounding. As a result, she was named to the All-Region and All-Conference Teams.

Men's and Women's Swimming – The teams represented the College well at the NJCAA National Championship in Buffalo, New York. The women finished the season in 6th place

(13th overall), and the men in 3rd place (9th overall) in the non-scholarship division. William deRouville set four school records this season, breaking the 800 free relay, 50 freestyle, 100 freestyle, and 200 freestyle previous records.

Mr. AJ Trump, Assistant Director of Athletics, will join us at Monday's meeting with several of our very successful players.

Phi Beta Lambda

Again this year, Ocean County College's Phi Beta Lambda (PBL) Chapter attended the New Jersey PBL State Leadership Conference in February at Mercer County Community College and was extremely successful. Professor Katherine Dillon, who serves as PBL's Advisor, Professor Barbara Napolitano, Professor Henry Schwartz, and Adjunct Professor Michael Forcella accompanied the students to the conference. Although unable to attend the competition, Dr. Virginia Reilly serves as the group's Co-Advisor, and Dean Dean La Bollita is a Professional Member.

Ocean County College Nursing Program

Ocean County College students continue to demonstrate the quality education they receive. Again, our Nursing Program graduates have achieved very impressive results on the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). The Council report recently received for OCC graduates who sat for the exam during the period April through September 2010 shows that 69 of 70, or 99 percent, passed the test. This follows a 100 percent pass rate during the last examination period from October 2009 through March 2010.

The success rate of our graduates attests to the fact that OCC's Nursing Program continues to be one of the best in the country. The students leave OCC well prepared to pursue their nursing careers because of the commitment and dedication of our faculty, clinical instructors, and Ms. Coleen Manzetti, Assistant Dean of Nursing.

Special Guests Bring Love Of Reading To East Dover

The students at East Dover Elementary School celebrated Read Across America Day in a big way this year, when over 20 local members of the community read at least one book to each class.

The annual reading motivation and awareness program calls for every child in America to celebrate reading on March 2—the birthday of beloved children's author Dr. Seuss.

The day fell during School Spirit Week, and Read Across America Day fell on the same day as Wear Your Pajamus to School Day, so it felt like the students were being read a bedtime story.

Toms River Council President Gregory P. McGuckin was shown into Eileen Jemison's fourth grade classroom by Principal Linda Downing, and he was give a choice of four books to read.


"I was a big reader as a kid," McGuckin said. "My mother was a reading teacher," he said as he sat down to read "Oh the Places You'll Go."

"The children were so excited," said Jemison. "They thought (McGuckin) was the president, so I had to explain."

Jemison was dressed in Dr. Seuss pajamas that she said she "breaks out once a year." After McGuckin read, one of the student's grandmothers was coming in to read "Green Eggs and Ham."

Ocean County College President Jon Larson brought two of his own books to read, and he donated them to Mrs. Michelle Gullace's second grade class.

Larson said he chose "Dogs Don't Do Ballet" because he

thought it was entertaining; and "I Wanna New Room," which was about a little boy who had to

move out of his bedroom because the family had a new baby. "How many of you have a baby sister or a baby brother at home?" Larson asked, and nearly half the students raised their hands.

"Where are all of you going to college?" he asked the second graders.

"I've done this lots of times before—it's always fun. They asked a lot of good questions, and they're all going to OCC," he joked.

Councilwoman Maria Mariaca read two Dr. Seuss books to Elizabeth Laird's second grade class: "Oh the Things You Can Do That are Good for You" and "Green Eygs and Ham."

Laird mode ham and green egg salad for the class, and said that the Toms River Educational Association gave éach class a Dr. Seuss book to add to their class library, and each child received a Dr. Seuss pencil.

Dennis Holzapfel, 7, said he liked the first book Maruca read to the class best. "I like non-fiction books because I like to read about animals. I have two dogs and one cat," he said.

Maria Fernicola, 8, said she knows Maruca's nephews. "Green Eggs and

Ham' is one of my favorite Dr. Seuss books, but I don't have a favorite; I like them all," she said.

"Today is fun-and we get to wear our pajamas," she added.

Principal Downing said that all the classroom doors were decorated with a Dr. Seuss book or their favorite story.

"Over the years we've gotten a warm reception from the Town Council and the Board of Education members. We invite them in for our big Career Day in May, and we ask people from that list if they'd like to come in and read," she said.

"Some years we have more people than others. This year we had a very good response, and it goes on all day." Downing said.

The next hig event at the school will be a Reading Rodeo in June, which is now in the planning stages.

"That's all I can say for now," Downing said. "There's going to be a big surprise."

Last year, Downing went airborne in a hot-air balloon on the school property at the end of a reading incentive.
