Academic Affairs

- Representatives from Academic Affairs and the Director of Grants met with a team from the Toms River School District to discuss a STEM grant opportunity with the Naval Air Systems Command (NAVAIR). The TR: TechReady is a multifaceted plan to increase the ability of Toms River Regional students to enter STEM career fields, particularly those aligned with the Navy's mission of "encouraging scientific research, development, and testing/evaluation related to the preservation of national security." OCC will be a secondary partner and will provide staff training, dual enrollment courses, and possibly an Academy Program.
- > Conversations are continuing with William Paterson University on a partnership to allow students to enroll in William Paterson courses and complete William Paterson degrees on the OCC campus.

> School of Arts and Humanities

The Ocean County College Repertory Theatre Company presented *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* from July 14 to 23, 2017. The play was directed by Mr. Paul Chalakani, College Lecturer II in Communications/Theatre and choreographed by Dr. Beth Willets-Brierley, Associate Professor in Communications/Theatre.

- Ms. Jayanti Tamm's grant proposal was accepted by the Jack School of International Study at the University of Washington. The grant will be used for faculty professional development to create an Indian Literature course.
- The Sign Language Society Club, co-advised by Ms. Kathy Basilotto and Ms. Saundra Piscitelli, Assistant Professor and College Lecturer II of American Sign Language, respectively, has been busy over the summer. The club hosted a silent dinner in July and is planning a summer beach bash in August at the Riverfront Park in Point Pleasant.
- College Lecturer II in Humanities and Fine Arts Lee Kobus has been working with the TEEM Rutgers Program to inspire undecided career path high school students. He introduced the students to music production and audio production, careers in which they had expressed interest. This encouraged one student to enroll in the Performing Arts Academy program, which will transition him to OCC when the PAA comes to the campus.

> School of Business and Social Sciences

- Jersey Educator Preparation Program Pilot developed by Ocean County College in collaboration with Stockton University; it is the first to be approved by the State. The program's primary goal is to develop highly trained education majors with strong content-based skills. The curriculum includes 12 credits in education and is designed to provide foundational courses for community college students to insure they are fully prepared for junior-level coursework at four-year institutions. The program is uniquely structured to equip students with the knowledge base to pass the Core Praxis as well as to introduce them to foundational concepts in education. The program is for immediate implementation, with an end date of 2021. Additional strategies and resources for supporting students in successfully passing the Core Praxis are being developed.
- Another exciting program on campus, beginning its second year, is the Big Brothers Big Sisters MIND Program. Under the leadership of Dr. Jane MacDonald, College Lecturer II in Education, OCC students are trained by Big Brothers Big Sisters to work with students on the Autism Spectrum. Each session contains interactive activities based on a theme, such as family or emotions. Last year's program brought together five students on the Autism Spectrum (Littles) and ten OCC students (Bigs) twice a month to develop the Littles' communication skills. The program was so well received that there are plans to make the program weekly and to double the number of Bigs and Littles participating.

School of Nursing and Health Sciences

> The School of Nursing staff is in the process of placing approximately 320 Nursing students within nine clinical agencies for the Fall 2017 semester. Placing students

within clinical sites includes validation that physical exams and immunization records are current, criminal background checks are clear and updated, orientation to each facility is complete, and access to the facility's electronic medical record is obtained. This Fall 2017 semester, there are 34 clinical groups, each requiring a Clinical Instructor to oversee students in the health care facility to which they are assigned.

Lecturers and faculty continue to meet throughout the month to maintain Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) Standards. The Assessment and Outcomes Committee and the Nursing Curriculum Committee are assessing the program's annual student achievement data to implement changes to enhance student success.

> School of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics

- The Makers Club continues to meet every Friday through July at the request of the students. Under the supervision of the club advisors, Dr. Angel Camilo, College Lecturer II in Biology, and Mr. Edmond Hong, College Lecturer II in Computer Studies, students have been working in the new Makers Club space in the College Center, Room 111 (formerly the faculty/staff dining area).
- Five students from OCC's chapter of HOSA (Health Occupations Students of America), attended the International Leadership Conference in Florida from June 21 to 25, 2017. Mr. Scott Farrell, College Lecturer II in Chemistry, chaperoned the students. HOSA chapters from 48 states, Washington, D.C., Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Canada, Mexico, Italy, and Germany were represented by over 10,300 students.

The following OCC students received recognition or awards at the conference:

- ➤ Ms. Shemesh Friedman placed in the top seven for Clinical Nursing. She is currently an LPN and is working on her prerequisites for RN.
- ➤ Ms. Juliet Tafaro placed in the top seven for Medical Assisting.
- ➤ Ms. Christina Fichner, OCC HOSA chapter president, placed in the top ten for Job Seeking Skills, her second year to do so.
- Mr. Steven Jones placed third for Extemporaneous Writing. Mr. Jones placed first at the New Jersey State Conference and received two medals at the International Conference.
- Five officers from OCC's Tau Iota Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa attended the 2017 International Honors Institute in Chicago, Illinois, from June 5 to 10, 2017. The following week, they attended the Middle States Region Honors Institute held in Allentown, Pennsylvania. The officers are continuing this momentum with weekly Thursday afternoon meetings to plan the upcoming year's events. Phi Theta Kappa

advisors are Dr. William Rickert, Professor of Mathematics; Dr. Jennifer Dellner, Professor of English and Literature; Ms. Carolyn Showalter, Assistant Professor of Mathematics; and Mr. David Rickert, Adjunct Faculty Member.

Center for Student Success

- > Disability Services has a new email address for inquiries and general correspondence, accommodations@ocean.edu. The website has been updated and should prove to be beneficial to students and families.
- An all-day Fall Tutoring Training program, developed by Tutoring Services, will be offered on August 30, 2017, for all programs involved with tutoring.
- Instructor training for the First-Year Experience Seminar was completed over three days. Participants were trained on the Early Warning System Pilot, including Dropout Detective, and were informed about the revised advising and career components, which seek to educate students on the Student Planning tool to, hopefully, encourage them to establish early relationships with their academic advisors.
- The Testing Center and the Academic Coaching area are concluding a pilot of the OCC Transitions to College program with Lacey Township High School utilizing the EdReady application to help two students pass the Accuplacer exam on their challenge attempt. The five-week pilot involved administering a diagnostic exam and creating customized learning paths for the two students. A "linchpin" component of the Transitions Program is the Academic Coaching provided by OCC whereby student progress is monitored and outreach is made to keep students motivated and on track. A second agreement is currently being negotiated with Southern Regional High School that will target as many as 150 students in 11th grade.

> Library

- With the retirement of Librarian Torris Andersen after eighteen years at OCC, the Library's Information Literacy program will now be coordinated by Mr. James Marshall, Library College Lecturer II. Mr. Marshall works on course development, information literacy, and assessment issues for the College; assuming the coordination of one of the Library's most important service missions will synch well with his current interests and responsibilities. Reference Librarian Caitlyn Cook will be the liaison to the Paralegal Program and Business Law courses and will develop the legal collection. Ms. Cook serves as the Library's Government Documents Librarian and as the OCC Archivist. She is looking forward to working with the College community on law-related information needs.
- Ms. Catherine Pontoriero, Librarian Assistant Professor for Reference Services, has been appointed to the American Library Association's 2018 Rainbow Book List GLBTQ Books for Children and Teens Committee. This committee creates an annual list of recommended GLBTQ fiction and non-fiction titles for young readers.

Ms. Pontoriero's participation on this committee requires a tremendous commitment, as committee members read multiple books each week to make their recommendations. Being appointed to an ALA committee is a hard-won honor, and Ms. Pontoriero's achievement and her dedication to meeting the information needs of GLBTQ youth are commended.

e-Learning and Learning Enterprises

Domestic Update

➤ On July 19, 2017, Ms. Melissa Bova, e-Learning Instructional Designer, and Ms. Rachel Doss, Interim Associate Director of e-Learning, conducted training classes as part of Ocean County College's partnership with Hudson County Community College. The training topics for the Learning Management System were Canvas Basics, Organizing Your Canvas Account, Canvas Administration Tools, Online Master Course Walkthrough, and Online Best Practices. Hudson online instructors will be enrolled in a three-week online training course starting August 7, 2017. The training course is similar to that offered to OCC online instructors. On August 30, 2017, Ms. Bova and Ms. Doss will be returning to Hudson County Community College to conduct a training session for the online instructors who will be teaching the master courses to be delivered for the Fall 2017 semester.

Hudson County Community College recently signed a separate contract with the Learning Management System, Canvas. After the contract is finalized, Ms. Bova and Ms. Doss will begin the process to export and import the master courses from OCC into the Canvas system for Hudson. The courses for the Fall 2017 semester will include Biology, Criminal Justice, Communications, Business, Math, and Political Science.

- The e-Learning program experienced exciting growth in the area of student enrollments from out-of-county markets. Robust marketing by Kiosk and "homegrown" programs has yielded 85% to 105% growth in out-of-county enrollments. These enrollments represent highly sought-after students in that they expand the College's outreach and enhance its support of in-county students with high levels of service at low tuition costs.
- The catalog of courses offered online continues to grow and has recently surpassed 200 courses. Some recent additions include additional fire science courses; many second-year language offerings, such as German and Hebrew; and a large number of 200-level courses.

In order to ensure that OCC's online courses are offering students the most current and up-to-date content, e-Learning has established a rotational cycle to ensure that every course will be audited and, if needed, revised within three years. While many courses are updated annually, the department's dedication to quality has led it to commit to in-depth consideration of content every three years.

> International Update

- The team is preparing for a four-week training and orientation program for three Egyptian institutions. Dr. Maysa Hayward, Dean of Instructional Outreach, Mr. Hatem Akl, CIO, and Mr. Salim Hussien, Director of International Partnerships, will be conducting training for Egyptian professors and students on the Learning Management System, Canvas, as well as the hybrid teaching and learning modality.
- The OCC leadership team and assigned colleagues will greet visitors from Egypt from August 9 to 16, 2017. Ain Shams University President, Dr. Abd El Wahab Ezzat, will be accompanied by Dr. Hussein Eissa, the former president and currently a member of the Egyptian Parliament, to discuss further agreements with OCC and its affiliated four-year universities to structure new programs, including Information Technology. The discussions will also include establishing a cooperation between OCC and a presidential initiative for an International University in Egypt.
- The team is pursuing potential ventures with Mr. Prasad K. Mathew, Director of International Affairs, at Hindustan University in Chennai, India. OCC is exploring the opportunity of contributing academically to the establishment of Hindustan University's new campuses in Oman and India.
- > OCC and Instituto Técnico Superior Comunitario (ITSC), a two-year college in the Dominican Republic, are in discussions for an articulation agreement for a Hospitality Management and Tourism program. The aim of this project will be to establish a framework of action for cooperation between OCC and ITSC that results in a dual-degree program for students in the Dominican Republic. To accomplish this goal, the team is working on aligning OCC's curriculum with ITSC, which will, hopefully, result in a degree program taught by both OCC and ITSC faculty.
- International partners are also being pursued in South America. To meet this objective, the team will participate in a conference call with UniEVANGÉLICA Centro Universitario in Brazil to discuss a potential dual-degree partnership. Additionally, a framework will be established for discussing specific action items with Riga Technical University in Latvia.

Finance and Administration

Continuing and Professional Education

A partnership has been established with the Ocean County Library System to offer seminars and programs for career training. The Library Director, Ms. Susan Quinn, is anxious to work with the College. The Library received a large grant from the New Jersey Department of Labor to promote its Career Connection initiatives, which will benefit the new partnership.

> Customized Training/Workforce Development

- An Information Session is planned in August for Ocean County long-term care, assisted living, and nursing facilities to discuss course and program offerings.
- > Up to 13 OCC classrooms have been offered for Corrections Officer testing on August 5, 2017.

> Technology and Business Careers

- > Fourteen Advanced Placement courses are being offered for high school teachers in August, three more than last year.
- > The New Pathways to Teaching program will launch in Fall 2017. Classes will incorporate a substantial increase in clinical work for potential teachers as well as substitute teaching, tutoring, and after-care program experience. The new program will provide teachers with more face-to-face time in the classroom.

> Allied Health

A \$10,000 dental information management software system was donated for use by students enrolled in the OCC dental training programs.

> Camps/Youth/Community Programs

➤ Kids' and Teens' Camps are well underway. Members of the staff are busy assisting parents with their needs and ensuring campers have a great experience on campus. The pre- and after-care programs for the campers, which were established after many requests last year, have proven to be quite successful.

> The Academy for Lifelong Learning

- ➤ The Active Adult Summer Program, Delight in the Joy of Summer, will take place on Wednesday and Thursday, August 16 and 17, 2017, and will include the following sessions:
 - > Poetry Writing Workshop, presented by Ms. Jayanti Tamm, Assistant Professor of English, will focus on the fundamentals of crafting a poem.
 - > Senior Scams, presented by Ms. Cynthia E. Boyd, Sergeant in the Ocean County Prosecutor's Office, will provide information on the latest senior scams in Ocean County.
 - ➤ A Wise Elder The Second Half of Life The Life and Work of Angeles Arrien, will explore the studies of Angeles Arrien, who was a cultural anthropologist, educator, award-winning author, and consultant to numerous

organizations and businesses inside and outside the medical field. Wisdom will be explored as a thread throughout the life cycle, and opportunities will be discussed to deepen and develop integrity and character.

A Planetarium presentation will look at the summer skies, with a laser blast at the conclusion of the show.


Program attendees will dine in the OCC Student Center.

Ocean Views

The Summer-Fall 2017 issue of Ocean Views, OCC's bi-annual newsletter for OCC alumni, the College family, and the community, is now available in print and online. This edition highlights local and global initiatives as well as stories related to the success of our students. Copies will be distributed at the Board meeting.

> TV Studio

The TV Studio is assisting the Ocean County Prosecutor's Office on two initiatives. The first is the production of "Not Even Once," a video component of an antiopiate/drug information and training program developed by the Manchester Police Department and the Prosecutor's Office. The video will be shown to students and other police departments. The second initiative is the production of a video in the ongoing series, "Did You Know." The in-studio recordings will include local community leaders, who will talk about the opiate/heroin epidemic in Ocean County.

Grants/Funding Awarded

- A \$2,750 grant from the Mid-Atlantic Arts Foundation will be used to support the Grunin Center for the Arts production of Black String, a South Korean musical group, on January 25, 2018. This program is presented in partnership with Stony Brook University and the lead presenter, Flushing Council on Culture and the Arts, aka Flushing Town Hall, in New York. The Project Director is Mr. Mark Wilson, Director of Cultural Affairs.
- Many Paths/One Future is a program to help all New Jerseyans find pathways to employment through training aligned to the needs of employers. The New Jersey Department of Labor will reimburse employers 50% of wages paid, up to \$1,500, to pre-approved student interns and employers. This is a non-credit opportunity. The Project Directors are Ms. Pamela Donahue, Associate Director of Academic Advising, and Mr. Jason Ghibesi, College Lecturer II in Political Science and History.

> Security

In accordance with New Jersey Public Law 2015, Chapter 220, and College Policy #2332, Reporting of On-Campus Criminal and Fire Events, attached is the monthly statistics report of crimes, fires, and other emergencies on campus for the reporting period May 25, 2017, through June 21, 2017.

Student Affairs

> Advising, Transfer, and Career Services

- As of July 18, 2017, 960 students have registered for the Fall 2017 semester via New Student Orientations, up from 701 at this time last year, representing an increase of 36%. The Advising staff, led by Ms. Michele Connolly, Assistant Director of Academic Advising, has been making continuous updates and improvements to the program over the summer, including:
 - ➤ Information on career planning in an effort to integrate career services and help students begin to conceptualize their long-term plan in the context of short-term goals.
 - Interactive elements, such as the use of Poll Everywhere, which allows students to engage in a group discussions via their cell phones.
 - > Short video clips and discussions on various topics, such as resiliency and time management.

A total of 120 parents have attended Parent Orientations so far this summer. Response to the program continues to be excellent, with 98% of parents indicating they were "very satisfied" with the information they received.

Counseling and Student Development Services

- > Since the end of May, 75 students have attended 15 Step by Step sessions. Twenty-four sessions are scheduled through the end of August to accommodate the remaining 383 students who are required to attend this intervention program because of their academic sanction status.
- The department is finalizing activities and programs for the Fall 2017 semester, including awareness and prevention programs on suicide, domestic violence, cigarette smoking, and restorative practices to mitigate the effects of stress. The third annual Town Hall on substance abuse is being planned with RWJ Barnabas Health and the DART Prevention Coalition.
- > The Student Support Services Program is concluding the second of the five-year program; the majority of program students have registered for the Fall 2017 semester.
- The Displaced Homemakers Program has been awarded an additional \$18,000 to provide short-term training and additional services to clients. OCC's program continues to be recognized as one of the model programs in the State.
- > Dr. Kate Pandolpho, Director of Counseling and Student Development Services, and Ms. Susan Ebeling-Witte, Student Intervention Specialist, continue their roles on the Executive Board of the New Jersey Community College Counselors Association. Dr. Pandolpho serves as the Secretary, and Ms. Ebeling-Witte is the Treasurer.
