#BIOGRAPHY of DR. PAMELA J. MONACO

Pamela J. Monaco was born and raised in Washington, D.C., a rare native of the capital city. Like many of the students she would teach, Pamela started college with one intention—to be a dentist—but changed majors a couple of times before graduating from The George Washington University with a degree in business. Her first job out of college was managing the Globe Bookshop chain. From there she became the mid-Atlantic sales representative for Viking Penguin Publishers, serving the territory from New Jersey through North Carolina. With the intention of owning her own independent bookshop, Pamela took a semester to expand her long love of literature and enrolled as a special student in the English graduate program at The Catholic University of America. When the department chair, Dr. Joseph Sendry, invited her to become a graduate assistant and asked her to teach an undergraduate drama class, Pamela's professional and personal passions surfaced, and Pamela discovered her calling: teaching.

Pamela's career focuses on providing educational opportunities to nontraditional and underserved student populations. While completing her doctoral studies in English at The Catholic University of America, Pamela taught as an adjunct for several community colleges in the greater Washington, D.C., area. This experience proved transformational, as Pamela discovered the vibrancy of the multigenerational, multicultural community college classroom. This experience led her to her first fulltime academic job at Thomas Nelson Community College in Hampton, Virginia. In addition to her full-time teaching position, Pamela became department chair, assistant division chair, and founder of the Thomas Nelson Players, the college's theatre company.

Pamela has served as faculty and administrator at a variety of colleges and universities, from twoyear colleges to research-intensive universities, but the positions shared a dedication to underserved student populations. The insights and knowledge to better serve these students and to support faculty and staff providing educational opportunities to these populations were honed through Pamela's work at Mississippi Valley State University, a Historically Black College or University (HBCU) in the Mississippi Delta; through the experience of teaching and working with military students and adult learners in the online environment at University of Maryland Global Campus (formerly UMUC); as the founding dean of arts and sciences at Brandman University, a twenty-seven campus university on the West Coast serving the working adult student; and as the vice president of academic and student affairs at Wright College, a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI) that is part of the City Colleges of Chicago. In each position, Pamela developed new skills to better educate students and engage faculty and staff as she enjoyed the opportunity of getting to know the beauty of our country while establishing friendships across the nation. Professional highlights include having been a Fulbright Scholar to Estonia, a National Endowment of the Humanities Fellow, a graduate of Harvard University's Institute for Management and Leadership in Education, and a volunteer at Cook County Jail in Chicago.

Pamela has been happily married to Don Kehne for almost twenty years. They met when Pamela was teaching a Shakespeare class, proof that teaching, literature, and theater improve life immeasurably. Don is the proud father of his daughter, Chelsea, and Pamela and Don have enjoyed raising together several fur babies, better known as cats.

MACE

Ocean County College is grateful to Salem Community College for the unique gift of the Ceremonial Mace. Created by Dennis Briening of Pennsville, New Jersey, the Mace is a staff symbolizing the history, values, and authority of the College. Mr. Briening crafted the Pyrex glass Mace, which is approximately four feet long, especially for Ocean County College.

A 1977 graduate of Salem Community College, Mr. Briening returned to Salem to manage its original Glass Center, serve as Instructional Chair for the Scientific Glass Technology program, and teach as an adjunct instructor in glass art for over thirty years. Mr. Briening served as scientific glass technologist at Hercules Research Center in Wilmington, Delaware, for twenty-six years and as a long-time member of the American Glassblowers Society.
